

Sports Premium - Academic Year 2020-21

Funding for this financial year will be approximately £16,960

What is the PE and Sports Premium Funding?

The government is providing funding of over £450 million per annum for academic years 2013-2020 to provide new, substantial primary school sport funding. This funding is being jointly provided by the Departments for education, Health and Culture, Media and Sport and will see money going directly to primary school head teachers to spend on improving the quality of sport and PE for all their children.

The sport funding can only be spent on sport and PE provision in schools.

Purpose of funding

Schools have to spend the sport funding on improving provision of PE and sport but they will have the freedom to choose how they do this.

The vision for the Primary PE and Sport Premium: **ALL** pupils leaving primary school **physically literate** and with the **knowledge**, **skills and motivation** necessary to equip them for a **healthy**, **active lifestyle** and **lifelong participation** in physical activity and sport

The funding has been provided to ensure impact against the following **OBJECTIVE:** To achieve <u>self-sustaining improvement</u> in the quality of PE and sport in primary schools. It is important to emphasise that the focus of spending must lead to long lasting impact against the vision that will live on well beyond the Primary PE and Sport Premium funding.

It is expected that schools will see an improvement against the following 5 key indicators:

Key achievements to date: Areas for further improvement and baseline evidence of need: Activities are planned throughout the year including enrichment days, charity events, and cultural diversity activities, to promote the profile of health and increase daily physical activity. Extra-curricular clubs run throughout the year, allowing pupils opportunities to get involved with physical exercises in an inclusive and supportive environment. Resourcing of play areas has been successful, in encouraging physical activity amongst pupils from all classes in the school. Sensory playground equipment has been installed and separated from main playground, thus ensuring pupils are not over stimulated and their sensory needs are met effectively through physical exercise. Resourcing of main playground has included climbing frames, slides and target hoops for pupils to use break/dinner times to gain appropriate opportunities to engage in physical activity. Strong emotional wellbeing culture within school. Mental Health first Aider as a member of the Senior Leadership Team, and large number of staff from EYFS, KS1 and KS2 trained in Mental Health First Aid awareness. Statutory Framework for Early Years foundation Stage (3.54) requires that outdoor space is 'fit for purpose,' (3.58) 'providers must provide access to an outdoor play area.' Merryfields are currently providing this in a suitable environment for our pupils, allowing access to active play and a 'free flow' environment.
